ALASKA.

Nome.
Lloyd Botts of Seattle, Wash., has two claims, on which is found cassiterite, three and one-half miles from Cape Prince of Wales and 140 miles north of the Nome district. The property is developed by a 150-ft. tunnel and ore was encountered 20 ft. from the portal. The vein is from 10 to 12 in. wide. The company will install a 10-stamp mill this summer. Assays show high values in tin. The company is known as the Seward Tin Co. and its principal offices are in Milwaukee.

The Lost River Tin Mining Co. has a number of claims and several fractions at Point Clarence Bay in Nome district, 30 miles east of Tin City. About 1000 ft. of development work has been done at a depth of 300 ft. on three cassiterite ledges averaging 15 ft. in width. The ledge assays 2% tin. A small force is running a drift to cut the ledge 15 ft. lower down. About 80,000 tons of tin ore is blocked out. A ledge of wolframite 13 ft. wide has also been uncovered that assays 15%. The gangue is fluorite. On one of the walls is a streak of tin ore 4 in. wide. The company is incorporated in Alaska for 5,000,000 shares at \$5 each. The officers of the company are: Leslie M. Crim, president; Peter Esh, vice-president; Chas. Randt, secretary, and Wm. O'Brien, treasurer, all of Seattle.

Juneau.
H. P. Harvey has 26 claims at the south end of Knights island that are developed by a tunnel in 80 ft. at a depth of 150 ft. and another tunnel in 200 ft. on the foot-wall, besides several other smaller ones. Considerable surface work has been done

retary, and Wm. H. Smith, treasurer. Some 2300 ft. of development work has been done in three tunnels on the Clipper, Caravel and Americus claims. The Clipper tunnel is in the upper oxidized zone and considerable carbonate ore is exposed that averages from 2½ to 3%. The Woodson tunnel is 75 ft. lower and has entered the top of the sulphide zone. A raise to the Clipper tunnel shows sulphide for only 20 ft. above the Woodson tunnel. An 80-ft. vertical winze from this tunnel averaged 2.66% copper, and the last 120 ft. of a 190-ft. incline winze averaged 2.21% copper. The ore is a good concentrating ore.

This production compares with an output of 26,054,000 lb. in February, 27,376,000 lb. in January and 22,742,000 lb. in March, 1908.

The Denn Arizona is sinking its shaft from the 1200-ft. level and since the resumption of operations on March 14 it has been sunk 20 ft. The shaft will be sunk as far as the conditions will allow.

The drift runs through this body for 75 ft.

Bowie.

A number of strong mining companies are operating at different points in the Dos Cabasas mountains.

The Howle & Hanneman Gold Mining Co., with home office at Bowie and branch office at Birmingham, Ala., has a property consisting of 39 claims in the Dos Cabasas range, nine miles from Bowie. The ore is found in fissure veins cutting through granite and porphyry contacts. The veins vary from 4 to 12 ft. in width. The ore, a sugary quartz, carrying sulphides with gold and silver values averaging \$10 per ton. On the hanging wall is a streak averaging \$74 gold and 66 oz. silver. Property is being developed by a series of five tunnels, none of them being less than 125 ft. in on the ledge. The longest one is in nearly 200 ft. and being driven with a view of tapping shaft at 800 ft. below the surface. Two shafts are down 160 and 100 ft. and these will be deepened. An air compressor is to be installed and negotiations are now pending looking to the erection of an aerial tram 2250 ft. long. The officers of the company are: G. H. Aldrich, president; J. M. Howle, secretary; J. H. Parmer, treasurer; W. P. Howle, general manager.

Six miles from Bowie in the Dos Cabasas range H. Henrich of Bowie and Jo Brown of Bisbee own a group of four claims, through which runs a ledge from 25 to 45 ft. wide. The ore is a white quartz with values of \$7.50 to 1 oz. in gold, 29 oz. silver and 3% lead. The ledge is easily followed for 7500 ft. A test of 3000 lb. made at a smelter returned 80.80
